

Volunteer SPOTLIGHT Judy McKernon on Responsibility and FUN!



Volunteers have been integral to life at Noble Horizons since its founding almost 50-years ago, and the absence of the Noble Horizons Auxiliary during the pandemic has been especially difficult. For almost a quarter-century, the Auxiliary, whose president is Judy McKernon, a daughter of one of the Auxiliary's founding members, has inaugurated the holiday season so it seemed timely to share a recent conversation with Judy.

Judy's father, Tom Wagner, was a local attorney chosen to administer the John H. and Ethel G. Noble Charitable Trust, the purpose of which was to "provide a place for older people to live out their lives in pleasant, homelike surroundings". Her mother, Fran, played a critical role in the organization of the Noble Horizons' Auxiliary in 1975. Today Judy carries out the Auxiliary's founding mission which is to help make life for Noble Horizons residents as pleasurable and as fulfilling as possible.

Judy's inherited love for Noble Horizons manifested later in her life. She worked locally in the insurance industry while also earning a degree in clinical psychology. She spent ten years as a school psychologist in Vermont but returned to the insurance industry in Connecticut where she could be closer to her mom. Shortly after her mother's passing, Judy retired and was asked to become an Auxiliary Board member. She joined the Board as its Secretary and went on to assume several roles, including co-chair of the Festival of Trees and her current position as Board President.

Judy feels strongly about honoring her mother's connection to the Auxiliary and one of her priorities is to attract younger members who can ensure that the organization her mother helped establish half a century ago will continue to enrich the lives of Noble residents for another 50 years. Where does Judy see herself in the future? Living at Noble Horizons, of course! Helping others is the undercurrent in Judy's life and we are grateful for her exceptional commitment to Noble Horizons.
